More Helpful Information about Print Competition

The Photochrome print division has really taken off this year; with a record number of 66 prints entered in February! It's great to see so many images and to see more members participating. To help our meetings run smoothly, please follow these procedures on print night:

Plan to arrive a bit early so that you can submit your prints by 7:30. Due to the increased volume we may not be able to accept late entries.

Review your print labels for completeness before bringing your entries to the print table. It is important that we can tell at a glance which category a print falls into. Your name and the print title should be legible (typed is preferable). I recommend that you print your labels at home (email me if you need the format). Also, please fill in the date at the bottom of the label. The name of the judge is optional; this is mostly for your information. The only thing we will add is the award if applicable.

Place your prints face-down in the appropriate pile: Color, Monochrome or Special Categories. You may enter two each in color and monochrome. Both of these are Pictorial. You may enter one in each of the special categories (Nature, Travel, etc.). Please remove protective sleeves before submission. If your print is selected to go on to N4C, you may place it in a protective sleeve after judging is complete. (Put your name on the sleeve so it can be reunited with your print after N4C judging).

At the end of competition, please take home all prints not selected for submission to N4C. This includes Honorable Mentions and all prints entered in Assigned Subjects.

With your support, I'm sure that our meetings will end on time. Please contact me if you have any questions or comments.

The one single most important thing you can do to improve your photographic technique is to learn to use a tripod. A tripod will produce sharper images with greater depth of field. This is absolutely essential for macro photography.

A tripod also helps you to make more carefully framed and composed images and reduces the number of "grabshots" that end up in the wastebasket.

Thomas Wrede: Adrift

Through March 26

Thomas Wrede searches for sanctuary within an environment increasingly subjugated to man's intrusion upon nature. Wrede's desire for asylum amidst chaos sends him seeking refuge in the infinite spaces that seem to hover at the remote edges of the world. Adrift upon endless expanses of beach, snow, and sea, Wrede renders beautiful the quietude of landscape in large-scale images that lure the viewer into their vastness. On the beach, he captures large swaths of sand dotted with people—extremely sharp specks frozen in the kind of detail that a medium-format camera affords. On the sea, he captures individuals wandering in stillness across a seemingly unending marsh plain or standing in shallow water that appears to continue forever.

Bill Owens: Leisure

Nathan Baker: People at Work

Through April 30

Bill Owens' show features images from the previously unreleased final installment of his landmark *Suburbia* series. Owens explores the wide variety of leisure activities and demonstrates his distinctive talent for creating images that are simultaneously direct, empathetic, and humorous. The show consists of color and black-and-white images taken between 1968 and 1980. While Owens looks at his subjects with a certain admiration, he doesn't shy away from exposing the stranger sides of a familiar world or incorporating elements of irony or comedy into seemingly straightforward images.

Nathan Baker's large-scale color photographs construct minutely detailed tableaux that condense many of the activities associated with any given occupation into one seamless image. The photographs amplify the contours of the American worker's routine and describe the complex

role of the individual in contemporary society. From the wheel design room in a manufacturing plant to the engine room of a gambling boat, Baker explores common industry, frankly fascinated with the rhythm of a Midwestern working class. This is not the world of international stock exchanges, sporting championships, and slick commerce. Instead, the artist describes the setting of the housepainter, the construction worker, and the repairman. Baker invests these environments with sincere esteem, enhancing their cultural significance and visual impact with his gestural aesthetic.

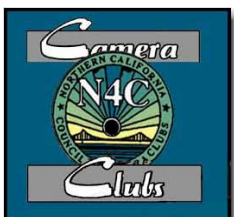
